Program Notes

Junior High Choir

Solitary Snowflake is a 3-part mixed voice holiday piece with piano accompaniment. This is an expressive choral work celebrates the snowflake with its unique qualities and ability to transform our world.

Senior High Choir

The Carol of the Bells melody was originally composed in 1914 and is based on a Ukrainian folk chant. The repeating minor motives and bell-like sounds add to the effect of this holiday classic.

A Christmas Gloria is a medley that combines a French holiday carol with the traditional Gloria. This choir piece features beautiful melodies and harmonies that add to the holiday spirit.

Junior High Band

Matrix March by Ed Huckeby is a traditional concert band march that has two distinct themes. The first, or A theme, repeats and has a major tonality followed by the secondary, or B theme, that has a minor harmonic feel, before the return of the A theme one last time. Marches are a part of the concert band's legacy and continue to be great teaching tools for steady pulse and style, while also being some of the audience's favorite selections.

Christmas Stomp takes it title from two sources. Obviously the first one being Christmas, this piece combines the holiday tunes Up on the Housetop, Jingle Bells, and We Wish You a Merry Christmas. The second is the Broadway musical STOMP! This show was and still is extremely popular for its use of random household objects like brooms and buckets to perform rhythmic and unique sounds. The arrangement utilizes <u>3 bucket</u> drummers who are featured in a call and response style with the band.



Jazz Ensemble

Mr. P.C. is a 12 bar jazz piece in minor blues form, composed by John Coltrane in 1959. The song is named in tribute to the bass player Paul Chambers who had accompanied Coltrane for years. It first appeared on the album *Giant Steps* where it was played with a fast swing feel. This performance featured soloists Nicole Burton, Dylan Bleau, Dominic Breton, Olivia Pockey, Riley Moffat.

Duke Ellington composed so many hit songs that many of his wonderful lesser-known compositions are often overlooked. Recorded in 1930 for the first time, *Ring Dem Bells* is one of these. It's from Ellington's early days and is characteristic of the band's pre- "Take The A Train" sound. This performance featured soloists Nicole Burton, Emily Ossont, Dominic Breton, Olivia Frank, Riley Moffat.

Here Comes Santa Claus is a Christmas song originally written and performed by Gene Autry in 1947, with music composed by Oakley Haldeman. Autry's original recording (in which he pronounces Santa Claus as "Santy Claus") was a top-10 hit on the pop and country charts; the song would go on to be covered many times in the subsequent decades. Other artists to record the song include Doris Day (1949), Bing Crosby and the Andrews Sisters (recorded May 10, 1949), Elvis Presley (1957), the Ray Conniff Singers (1959), Keely Smith (1960), Alvin and the Chipmunks (1961), Bob B. Soxx & the Blue Jeans (1963), Hank Thompson (1964), in excerpt by The Beach Boys as part of their song "Child of Winter" (1974), Willie Nelson (1979), Glen Campbell, RuPaul, The Wiggles (1997), Billy Idol (2006), Bob Dylan (2009), Mariah Carey (2010), Chicago (2011), the Glee cast (2013), and Pentatonix (2018).

Senior High Band

The Last Rose of Summer is a work that shares its title with a poem by Irish poet Thomas Moore in 1805. The beautiful melodies and swooning style capture the prose: 'Tis the last rose of summer, Left blooming alone; All her lovely companions Are faded and gone; No flower of her kindred, No rose-bud is nigh, To reflect back her blushes Or give sigh for sigh! I'll not leave thee, thou lone one. To pine on the stem; Since the lovely are sleeping, Go, sleep thou with them Thus kindly I scatter Thy leaves o'er the bed, Where thy mates of the garden Lie scentless and dead. So soon may I follow, When friendships decay, And from love's shining circle The gems drop away! When true hearts lie wither'd, And fond ones are flown, Oh! who would inhabit This bleak world alone?

P. Eyeitch Tchaikovsky! (gesundheit) is the long last nephew (twice removed from the Bolsheviks) of the famous composer Peter Tchaikovsky. One winter, after escaping from the Home for the Bewildered through the great gate of Kiev, Tchaikovsky! (gesundheit) showed Uncle Peter his Great Gourmet Ballet, The Nuts and Crackers Sweet. It was dedicated to his best friends at the home, the Basso, Ivan the Bearable (who could barely carry a tune); and the Tenor, Raspy Putin (the name says it all). Uncle Peter later used the composition as the foundation for his famous ballet of a similar title. The American composer David Shafer acquired the manuscript in a fierce bidding war at the Christie's International House of Pancakes (Moscow, Ohio). After paying seven rubles, a world record for a Tchaikovsky! (gesundheit), Maestro Shafer lovingly orchestrated three of the most scrumptious movements from the Great Gourmet Ballet, The Nuts and Crackers Sweet.

Christmas Classics by James Swearingen is a traditional Christmas Carol medley of the music we all associate with the holiday season. This work contains the songs We Wish You A Merry Christmas, Joy To The World, What Child Is This, Good King Wenceslas, Silent Night and Angels We Have Heard On High.
