On February 10th we celebrated the retirement of Dani Haskell's basketball jersey in recognition of her extraordinary

contributions to Western New York basketball and the profound impact she has had on our school and community. Dani's achievements on the court are remarkable, but what she represents to Franklinville and beyond is even greater.

From a young age, Dani was more than just a gifted athlete—she was an inspiration. She embodied the hard work, heart, and perseverance that define our community. She didn't just play basketball; she gave everything she had to her school, her teammates, and the town that supported her. Whether she was working on her shot in an empty gym, competing in front of a packed crowd, or mentoring younger players, Dani always carried herself with grace, humility, and an unrelenting drive to succeed.

During her historic high school career, Dani scored an astounding 3,227 points, making her the all-time leading scorer in Western New York history, male or female. She also holds the distinction of being the

second-leading scorer in New York State girls' basketball history. Her dominance on the court helped lead Franklinville to a New York State Class D Championship in 2019, giving our town a moment of pride and celebration that will never be forgotten. She was named New York State Class D Player of the Year in both 2018 and 2019, cementing her status as one of the best players to ever come out of Western New York.

But beyond the records and accolades, Dani represented something even more important—a dream realized for so many young athletes in our community. She showed our students that small-town kids can achieve big-time success. She proved that with enough dedication and belief in yourself, anything is possible. She gave our younger athletes someone to look up tonot just because of her talent, but because of the kind of teammate, leader, and role model she is.

Even after high school, as she continued her career at Canisius College and St. Bonaventure University, she remained a source of pride for Franklinville. No matter where she played, she carried our town's name with her. Watching her excel at the collegiate level, now finishing her career playing for Coach Jim Crowley at St. Bonaventure, is a full-circle moment that reminds us all of how far hard work and passion can take you.

Of course, none of this would be possible without the unwavering love and support of her family—her dad, Jeff, mom, Jill, sister, Ally, and brother, Josh. They have been pillars in our community, and their belief in Dani helped shape her into the person and player she is today. But beyond her immediate family, Dani has also been supported by an extended family of basketball lovers—a group that has cheered her on through every milestone, every game, and every challenge. Whether it was at the local gym, on road trips to tournaments, or in the stands at championship

Their unwavering support and love for the game have played an undeniable role in her journey.

Dani means everything to our school and town. She has given us memories that will last a lifetime, moments of pure joy and pride, and a legacy that will continue to inspire future generations. Retiring her jersey is not just about honoring her incredible career; it's about recognizing the impact she has had—and will continue to have—on Franklinville.

There is no one more deserving of this honor than Dani Haskell.

- Must be and have been a resident of the District (but need not be a taxpayer) for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one (1) year immediately before the election
- May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year

- May not reside with another member of the same school board as a member of the same family
- May not be a current employee of the school board
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office
