Understanding Our School Budget: Investing in Our Future

School budgets are the financial road map to the resources needed to educate our students, support our teachers, and maintain safe, well-equipped learning environments. The budget ensures that taxpayer dollars are used as efficiently as possible to provide the best possible education to our community's children.

Where Does the Money Come From?

Revenues for the school budget come from three (3) main sources:

- 1) 70% State Funding -Allocations from New York State based on many factors, mainly student enrollment
- 2)19% Local Funding Primarily property taxes
- 3)11% Other Funding Special funding for specific educational needs

How is the Money Spent?

Every dollar in the budget is allocated to ensure student success. The general breakdown for expenditures is:

 61% - Instruction & Student Services

 Teacher Salaries & benefits, classroom materials, technology and student support services

- 2)22% Facilities & Operations Building maintenance, utilities, school safety and debt service associated with capital projects
- 3)9% Transportation Busing and Transportation facilities
- 4)3% Extracurricular Activities Arts, Clubs & Athletics
- 5)5% Administrative Costs District Staff and essential operations

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that a public hearing of the qualified voters of the Franklinville Central School District, Cattaraugus County, (the "District") Franklinville, New York, will be held in the Cafeteria at Franklinville Central Elementary School building in the District on Tuesday, May 6, 2025, at 5:30 PM, for the presentation of the 2025-2026 budget;

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Board of Education of the District (the "Board") will have prepared and completed a detailed statement in writing of the amount of money which will be required during the ensuing 2025-2026 fiscal year for school purposes, specifying the several purposes and the amounts for each. The amount for each purpose estimated necessarv for payments to boards of cooperative educational services (BOCES) shall be set forth in full with no deduction of estimated state aid. Such statement will be available for review to residents of the District during the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. from May 6, 2025 to May 20, 2025 (exclusive of Saturdays, Sundays and holidays), at the District Clerk's Office in the Junior-Senior High School;

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Annual Meeting and Vote ("Annual Vote") of the qualified voters of the District will be held in the Gymnasium Foyer at the Ten Broeck Academy Junior-Senior High School in the District on Tuesday, May 20, 2025, between the hours of 12:00 PM and 8:00 PM, for the purpose of electing one (1) member of the Board, voting on the budget of the District for the 2025-2026 fiscal year and transacting such other business as may be authorized by law;

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the election of members of the Board shall be held to fill one (1) position on the Board. The candidate receiving the highest vote total shall be elected to a five-year term (commencing July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2030) to fill the vacancy created by the expiration, on June 30, 2025, of the term of Sara Hatch;

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that petitions nominating candidates for the office of the member of the Board shall be filed with the District Clerk at her office in the Junior-Senior High School, not later than Monday, April 21, 2025, between 9:00 AM and 5:00 PM. Each petition shall be directed to the District Clerk, shall be signed by at least twenty-five (25) voters of the District, or 2% of qualified voters who voted in the 2024 Annual Vote, whichever is greater, must state the name and residence of the candidate, and the residence of the signer; AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that voting at the Annual Vote shall consist of the Board election, voting on the following propositions, and voting on any other propositions as may be authorized by law and the rules of the Board to be voted on at such time:

PROPOSITION NO. 1 – 2025-2026 BUDGET

Shall the following resolution be adopted?

RESOLVED, that the basic budget for the Franklinville Central School District (the "District") for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2026, as presented by the Board of Education, is hereby approved and adopted, and the required funds therefor are hereby appropriated and the necessary real property taxes required shall be raised by a tax on the District's taxable property to be levied and collected as required by law.

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that applications for absentee ballots may be obtained from the District Clerk between the hours of 9:00 AM and 3:00 PM Monday through Friday, except holidays, at her office located in the Junior-Senior High School or by email at: tbowers@tbafcs.org. Completed applications must be received by the District Clerk at least seven (7) days before the Annual Vote, if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or the day before the Annual Vote, if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. The District Clerk must receive absentee ballots no later than 5:00 PM, on Tuesday, May 20, 2025, to be canvassed and counted. A list of persons to whom absentee ballots are issued will be available for inspection to qualified voters of the District in the office of the District Clerk on and after May 15, 2025, between the hours of 9:00 AM and 3:00 PM on weekdays before May 20, 2025, the day set for the Annual Vote, and said list will be posted at the polling place of the Annual Vote. Any qualified voter may challenge the acceptance of an absentee ballot of any person on such list by making the challenge and the reasons therefore known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls;

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that military voters who are qualified voters of the District may apply for a military voter ballot by requesting an application from the District Clerk by mail or email at: tbowers@ tbafcs.org. Applications for military voter ballots must be received by the District Clerk by or prior to 5:00 p.m., (EDST) on April 24, 2025. In a request for a military application or ballot, military voters may designate their preference for receiving their application or ballot by mail, facsimile transmission or email. If no designation is indicated, the military ballot application and ballot will be transmitted by mail. Irrespective of the preferred method of transmission designated by a military voter, a military voter's original military ballot application and military ballot must be returned by mail or in person to the office of the District Clerk at 31 North Main Street, Franklinville, NY 14737, and received no later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 20, 2025, to be canvassed and counted. A list of all persons to whom military voter ballots shall have been issued will be available for inspection in the Office of the District Clerk on and after May 15, 2025, between the hours of 9:00 AM and 3:00 PM on weekdays before May 20, 2025, the day set for the Annual Vote, and such list shall also be posted at the polling place of the Annual Vote. Any gualified voter may challenge the acceptance of a military voter ballot of any person on such list, by making the challenge and the reasons therefore known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls;

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that applications for early mail ballots may be obtained at the Office of the District Clerk. Applications for early mail ballots may be accepted beginning April 2, 2025 through May 13, 2025, to receive the ballot by regular mail, and no later than May 19, 2025, to have the ballot delivered in person. All completed ballots must be received by the District Clerk not later than 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, May 20, 2025, to be canvassed and counted. A list of all persons to whom early mail ballots shall have been issued will be available for inspection in the Office of the District Clerk on and after May 15, 2025, between the hours of 9:00 AM and 3:00 PM on weekdays before May 20, 2025, the day set for the Annual Vote, and such list shall also be posted at the polling place during the Annual Vote, and any qualified voter may challenge the acceptance of an early mail voter ballot of any person on such list, by making the challenge and the reasons therefore known to the Inspector of Election before the close of the polls;

AND FURTHER NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that pursuant to a rule adopted by the Board under §§2035 and 2008 of the Education Law, any referenda or propositions to amend the budget, otherwise to be submitted for voting at the Annual Vote, must be filed with the Board at its Regular Meeting on or before April 22, 2025, at 5:00 PM; must be typed or printed in English, must be directed to the District Clerk and signed by at least twenty-five (25) qualified voters of the District (representing 5% of the number of voters who voted in the previous Annual Vote); and must state the name and residence of each signer. However, the Board will not entertain any petition to place before the voters any proposition the purpose of which is not within the powers of the voters to determine, or any proposition which fails to include a specific appropriation where the proposition requires the expenditure of monies.

How we treat coaches with respect and trust. We believe in their leadership, we embrace tough lessons, and we work together putting team over self.

How we treat opponents with class and sportsmanship. We compete fiercely, but we never lose sight of our shared love for the game. We shake hands. We honor the effort.
